

SNODLAND MILLENNIUM MUSEUM

The Old Fire Station

Snodland's volunteer fire brigade was formed in 1897 and the Misses Hook (of the paper Mill family) leased their depot to the Parish Council. In 1915 Maude Midsummer Hook gave land in Waghorn Road to the Parish Council to enable them to build a new fire station. This was achieved in 1923. It served until 1948, after which the building was used for a variety of purposes.

In 1994, to commemorate their centenary, Snodland Parish Council held a local history exhibition in the Devonshire Rooms, Waghorn Road, Snodland.

This was very successful. Exhibits were drawn from the Council's archives, supplemented by others loaned by parishioners.

With this in mind, as the Millennium approached, the Council decided that it would like to create a local museum as its millennium project.

It purchased the old fire station in Waghorn Road (ownership of which had transferred to the District Council) and renovated it.



The Museum was opened on 4 October 1999 by Jonathan Shaw MP.






The oldest exhibits come from the gravel pits in the parish excavated some years ago. These include a fine hand axe

and part of a mammoth tusk.







A Roman villa in Snodland has been excavated intermittently since the 1840s, and part of the estate was recently found to extend beyond the railway line (above). A major find of 4643 coins was made here in 2007.



Most of the Roman finds on display are on loan from the Maidstone Area Archaeological Group, who spent several years working on the villa.



THOMAS FLETCHER WAGHORN (1800-1850)

Snodland's most famous Parishioner was Thomas Fletcher Waghorn, who pioneered the Overland Route to India through Egypt in the 1830s. The museum has a good collection of material relating to him and his enterprise.

THE HOOK FAMILY

The Hook family came to Snodland in 1854-5 as new owners of the paper mill. Their influence on Snodland is still felt through the many benefactions they made. They set up a Swedenborgian Society here.




Sadly little has survived here of personal effects of the Hook family, although we have Maude's memoir of Agnes and also many of Anna Maria's copies of Emanuel Swedenborg's published writings in fine mid-nineteenth century editions. The Hook legacy is equally evident in the town in many buildings which they financed for which we have both pictures and some documentation.







THE PAPER MILL



Unfortunately over the years the Paper Mill has thrown away most of its archive, which originally extended back to the eighteenth century. We do have a few items on loan, together with other material, including more than fifty photographs of the fire of 12 August 1906.

THE CEMENT INDUSTRY

Again there is little material to hand as the surviving archives of local cement works are held by Lafarge Cement and are currently inaccessible. We have some pictures of several works in the Medway valley, including Lee's and Holborough works.



FAMILY HISTORY

The museum has much to interest the family historian. A database of Snodland parishioners can be consulted, but is also available on-line at www.snodlandhistory.org.uk.

Other material includes:

- (a) photocopies of the National (Brook Street) School log-books, 1863-1930, and of the admission registers from the late nineteenth century to 1930. We have many class photographs for Brook Street from 1870 and some for Holmesdale, especially c.1949-1953.
- (b) Census returns for Kent 1841-1911; we also have electronic copies of some local parishes for 1841, 1861, 1881 and 1901; and of Snodland 1841-1911.
- (c) copies of Snodland church and cemetery registers to the midtwentieth century.
- (d) Many Snodland directories 1847-1938 also available on-line.

PICTURES



Our picture collection continues to grow and covers a wide variety of subjects arranged under headings. Copies are available for perusal in files: e.g. Churches; Events; Industry; Landscape; People, River; Roads; etc.

Snodland Historical Society is particularly collecting postcards published by Alfred Hambrook, stationer in the village c.1901-1950. These cover many places in Kent as well as local views and events.

BUILDINGS

A project is in hand to study the pre-1914 buildings, including any which have been demolished. We have modern photographs of individual properties (taken as part of the research for an England's Past For Everyone project) and many old pictures and documents.
